henever the Atlanta Falcons are on TV this football season, Fred will be watching with more than a little longing. "That could've been me," he'll think.

But Fred never got that chance. Four years ago, while driving to a tryout with the NFL team, he fell asleep at the wheel and lost control. His car went over the guardrail, and flipped multiple times.

Grateful to still be alive, Fred thought he could make it to Atlanta for the tryout. But then he realized he couldn't move his legs. His right leg was pinned in the wreckage. His left leg was . . . gone. It had been severed in the crash.

His life then took some major twists and turns. At first, good ones: He fell in love and got married. When his wife gave birth to twin boys, she went to stay with her mom for a while, "and she never came back," says Fred. Fred couldn't find steady work. He had trouble getting disability insurance. He struggled with anxiety, depression, and PTSD.

One night in late 2022, Fred decided to end it all. He wrote a suicide note, leaving what little money he had to his ex and his twin sons. His gun was loaded when the phone rang. It was his best friend. Fred answered and said, "What's up?" The friend could immediately tell something wasn't right, and asked, "Are you okay?" Fred cocked the gun. The friend heard it, and switched over to a video call. He said, "Dude, you look like death."

The friend talked Fred down from the edge, saying, "Something told me to call you at that moment. I didn't know why. But now I do." Fred emptied the gun, put it in a bag, and buried it deep in his closet.

Things got better . . . briefly. Fred found a work-from-home job. But he was in constant pain — mentally and physically. He smoked pot to numb it all. He eventually lost that job and, unable to make rent, was evicted. He fell into depression. He couldn't find any place to stay, so he slept in his car in a Walmart parking lot.

That's when he heard about The Union Mission . . .

### **FINDING HOPE**

When Fred first called the Mission, there weren't any openings. He kept calling, and one particular staffer kept encouraging him to be persistent.

"He told me he had been through a process like I was going through," Fred says.

"He said, 'I've been in your shoes. But I went to the shelter and turned things around. Now I work here at the shelter. Now I'm giving back."

Those conversations buoyed Fred. He felt hope again.

When he came through our doors early this year, he immediately felt like things were falling into place. Thanks to friends like you, his immediate needs were met with meals, clothes, and a bed.

Our team helped him get doctor's appointments and meds to address his physical and emotional pain. We also helped him pursue Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI).

And even though he's still separated from his wife, he maintains a relationship with his twin sons, now 2. He calls them every night.

Fred is optimistic about his future, and he's grateful for the Mission's help — and yours.

"If it weren't for the Mission, I'd probably be out on the street somewhere," he says. "I'd probably be thinking about suicide again.

"So I praise God for the Mission. I'm so thankful for this place. It's heaven-sent, for sure. Truly, I love this place."

# A tent to Serve

People come to The Union Mission for all kinds of reasons.

Itruly love The Union Mission. They care deeply for the homeless. As for me, I believe everyone deserves to be treated kindly. Everyone needs to know that they are cared for and that someone is pursuing them. That's why I'm here. I'm watching out for them, too.

In 2016, I was searching for my twin brother, Cullen, all over Kansas City. Despite his schizophrenia and drug use, he's still my twin brother. He was my best friend growing up. I did resent him as a young person just because I didn't understand the sickness that he dealt with. I just thought he was destroying our family. He ended up on the streets and homeless. I began searching for him and putting flyers out all over the city.

I came across a mission similar to
The Union Mission which was my first
experience with a homeless shelter.
I'm so glad God brought me to that
mission in Kansas City because I didn't
even know a ministry like that existed.
They recognized him with the pictures
that I had on the flyer and gave me
updates when they last saw him. I
thought to myself, "What an amazing
organization!"

I retired medically as a [U.S. Marine Corps] staff sergeant after a spinal injury in 2011. I was a part of some great tours like OIF (Operation Iraqi Freedom) and others.

With caring for a young daughter, that spinal injury was definitely a struggle. I didn't want to do anything else in my life except be a Marine. I went through a severe bout of depression. The same year of my injury, my three best friends were killed in action in Afghanistan. My absolute best friend who was scheduled to come home from deployment ended up dying alone. It rocked my world and put me in such a dark place. I didn't want to wake up. I knew I didn't have a choice because I was a single mom. Quitting was not an option. Bella, my daughter, kept me going though those times. I thank God that He took care of me during that time and provided for our needs.

If you believe in something and you truly care about it, your actions speak loudly. I believe that my passion for the Mission is contagious. The Union Mission is not trying to put a Band-Aid on a wound, they're really trying to get to the bottom of the issues and fix those issues. My heart is here. God willing, I want to always continue this service. Serving here keeps my head in the game. If I could do this every day for the rest of my life, I would be a happy person, personally and spiritually.

I lost sight of God and went down a bad path [after losing so many friends in Afghanistan.] Ironically, searching for my brother actually helped me rebuild that relationship with God. I thank God every day I wake up now. I feel that doing something purposeful for someone or with someone is extremely effective. I have been dealt with so graciously by God, why would I not want to give back?
